
# Orchid Conservation Alliance 2019 Annual Report

2019 was an incredibly successful year. Our total revenue for the year was \$190,998, with our primary revenue streams coming from donations and memberships and our Orchids in the Wild Trip profits, along with other fund raising activities. Our expenses for 2019 (\$112,286) are summarized in the pie chart below. We can proudly state that our major expense is the support of the reserves, followed by expenses related to advertising and promotion, and finally, office expenses. All directors of the OCA serve pro bono..



#### **ORCHID CONSERVATION ACTIVITIES**

In early August Steve Beckendorf and Peter Tobias attended the VI Scientific Conference on Andean Orchids in Medellin, Colombia. Some of the meeting was devoted to orchid pollination by bees, with remarkable videos showing bees landing on orchids and departing with pollen. After the meeting Tobias went to visit the Reserva Los Magnolios maintained by the Fundación Salvamontes several hours by bus north of Medellin. In 2017 and 2018 the OCA donated a total of \$48,500 to assist with the establishment of the Salvamontes reserves. Tobias says that he came away much impressed by the work that

Salvamontes is doing and also very impressed by the orchid richness of the areas currently under protection. Tobias saw a tree near where Salvamontes wants to establish a research station that had two different clones of *Dracula chimaera* blooming simultaneously. "An amazing sight" said Tobias.

This past year the OCA received \$21,000 upon the dissolution of the International Pleurothallid Alliance (IPA). Given that Fundación Salvamontes wants to expand its holdings and given that much of their orchid richness is pleurothallid orchids, OCA's directors decided to commit the IPA donation to expansion of Fundación Salvamontes' reserves. Fundación Salvamontes is currently applying for funding from the Rainforest Trust. If that process is successful, OCA will donate the money through Rainforest Trust's 1:1 matching program to fund Fundación Salvamontes' expansion by \$42,000.

In other news, OCA's directors donated \$33,950 directly to Fundación Ecominga in Ecuador. OCA has supported Fundación Ecominga and its reserves several times since OCA's inception in 2005. Some of these funds were for land acquisitions in which Rainforest Trust did not participate and some were specified by the donor for purposes other than land acquisition, such as legal fees and guard salaries.

In 2019 we also committed \$68,000 to expansion of Fundación Ecominga's Dracula Reserve in northern Ecuador. It was expected that the \$68,000 would be donated in 2019, but administrative delays with Rainforest Trust's 1:1 matching program delayed that donation. Those problems have been resolved and the money was sent just last week, enabling Fundación Ecominga to receive \$136,000 to expand the Dracula Reserve. This money is going specifically for purchase of properties at elevations not currently protected. In mountainous regions like the Andes, microclimates and ecological niches can change within a few hundred meters of elevation and the orchid flora, as well as other flora and fauna, also vary with the elevation changes. Thus, to protect the orchid diversity of a region, properties at varied elevations must be included in the reserve.

2019 also saw the OCA commit \$40,000 to a new reserve organization, the Fundacja Biodiversitatus. The Fundacja Biodiversitatus is based at the University of Lodz and managed by Marta Kolanowska. Prof Kolanowska is Assistant Professor of Geobotany and Plant Ecology. She has done numerous botanical explorations in southern Colombia and is working to establish a reserve named La Palma and an associated research station in Colombia's Sibundoy Valley. The research station and reserve will be used for student training in botany and ecology. The property purchased was visited by Steve Beckendorf and Stig Dahlstrom who both enthusiastically supported the funding. The funds we donated purchased 72 acres. Coincidentally, the La Palma reserve is not too far from Reserva Yumartan, just outside the Sibundoy valley, the establishment of which the OCA funded in 2013. We are hopeful that the two reserves will synergise.



# ORCHIDS IN THE WILD TOURS FOR 2019 In 2019 the OCA conducted 5 Orchids in the Wild™ tours.

In March of 2019 the first tour traveled to the southwestern part of the province of Yunnan (China) led by Wenqing Perner (Hengduan Biotechnology) and Hong Jian (Kunming Forestry Institute). The group was able to see over 50 different orchid species in bloom in habitat, with the highlights including *Paphiopedilum armeniacum*, *Vanda brunnea*, *Dendrobium lituifolium*, *Vandopsis undulata*, *Pleione yunnanensis*, *Phalaenopsis wilsonii* and *Holcoglossum himalayicum*. A special treat was the opportunity to watch (and film) a male greater hornbill feeding the female and her young through a hole in a tree.

In May and June of 2019, two separate groups traveled to Manaus, Brazil to board 'The Otter', a wonderful amazon river boat captained by Gilberto Castro (known for his role as the boat captain for several of the Amazon trips of the renowned botanical artist, Margaret Mee). The tours traveled up the Rio Negro river, literally floating up to the orchids of the flooded Amazon forest in smaller, flat bottom canoes. They saw lots of orchids as well as many birds including hoatzins and blue and gold macaws. On one late afternoon trip 8 sloths were spotted high up in the trees; in the morning at the same location not one was to be seen!


A small group traveled to Madagascar in September of 2019 on a trip organized by orchid experts Johan and Clare Hermans. The group traveled south from Antananarivo through the highlands and later to the eastern coastal area, visiting a number of different habitats including inselbergs, spiny forests, dry subtropical forests, moist evergreen rainforests and coastal dunes. Trip participants were able to see over 70 different orchid species in bloom, in addition to enjoying the lemurs, chameleons, geckos, moths and birds of this amazing country.

In October, the last tour of the year traveled to Papua New Guinea. The group spent most of the time in the central highlands, enjoying the incredible cultural diversity of this country, spotting at least 80 different orchid species in bloom, and hiking up the country's highest mountain (Mt. Wilhelm, although only one participant made it to the summit). A subgroup also traveled to the nearby island of New Britain, enjoying more cultural activities, WWII artifacts, snorkeling and swimming with dolphins, a climb up a live volcano, and an event filled trip to the highest mountain of the island to find orchids (which was unfortunately cut short by torrential rain..who knew that jeeps could float? but that is another story).

#### ORCHIDS IN THE WILD TOURS FOR 2020 AND BEYOND

The OCA has a number of tours planned for 2020. In March, immediately following the World Orchid Conference in Taiwan, the OCA Orchids in the Wild tour will travel to southern Yunnan. The tour itinerary is completely different from the 2019 tour, but is planned to see many different orchid species in bloom (e.g. dendrobium, paphiopedilum, pleione, and phalaenopsis) as well as wild elephants and black crested gibbons. There are still a few spaces open on this tour. In July, a tour to Colombia is planned, although details are not available at this time. In late September, we have a completely new tour, this time to Western Australia. The tour begins and ends in Perth, and is led by Australian orchid expert Andrew Brown. There are a few spaces open on this tour, but it is filling quickly. Finally, in October, our third tour to Madagascar is planned, again led by Johan and Clare Hermans (sorry this trip is fully subscribed). In 2021, we are thinking about tours to Sikkim, Brazil and Madagascar, but none of these tour itineraries or dates have been established as of this time.








